"I did miss my family while I was in Ecuador and the Galapagos but I think that this trip was exactly what I needed to use as a kind of test. My top three colleges are located four to five states away from home. When people know this, the first thing that they ask is, "Aren't you going to miss your family?". Of course I'm going to miss my family but I think that the best thing I could do is separate myself from them and figure things out for myself.

This trip also changed the way I see small details in my life. Before the trip I didn't really understand the difference between the opportunities that we, as Americans, get. Everyone talks about these opportunities but I always thought that they were up for grabs for everyone around the world. I came to realize that most people don't even get a high school level education, which is something we take advantage of and don't appreciate it.

Once I saw my family, I hugged them like I had never hugged them before because I had missed them so much but I would do this trip again and again.

I want my career to have no borders because I want to be able to use both my languages and help people around the world. This was my experience which wouldn't have been possible without the help of Farther Foundation."
